How to 'magpie'

Suggested structure

Introduction – Approaching the forest. How did you (or your main character) get there?

Main Body 1 – Describe one part of the forest. e.g. the trees and birds that fill them

Main Body 2 – Describe another part of the forest e.g. a stream flowing through it

Conclusion – What does the forest mean to you?

Extension: Consider the different layers of the forest and use paragraphs to describe each one.
